

Not really. Not 6C since the qualification is "4th highest of longest and strongest (true here) to an honour (not true here)".

Which of the 4 candidates are we going with?

Look at the auction:

{S} is showing 12..14Pts and a balanced hand.

{N} is showing 13..18Pts and a balanced hand, enough for game regardless, but out of range of a NT slam.

That is 25..32 JPts, {W} has 0Pts, so {E} has approximately 8..15 Pts.

{E} is quite strong and should get the lead several times.

{W} will never get the lead after the initial opening lead.

Which of the 4 candidates are we going with?

8C is possible, but for it to work, requires {E} to have a strong L4C (C:KQTx) and each of {NS} L2-C. {E} needs xC to crossover to {W}'s established clubs after 2 or 3 C tricks. Unlikely.

When {NS} just bid to 3NT like this, they generally do not have good majors as they may have been bid if they did. Therefore a major lead for the defenders is probably good.

We noted that 4S would be confusing. So lead 9H.

On most opening leads {E} wins AS AH AC & JH (QH losing to KH) = 4 tricks.

When {W} leads 9H, assuming that {N} plays low, {E} ducks and to win the trick {S} has to play KH now. This promotes QH for a 5th trick.



Week 12 Slams

There are four categories of slams:

Small suited slam Small No Trump slam

6C 6D 6H 6S 6NT

Grand suited slam Grand No Trump slam

7C 7D 7H 7S 7NT

We looked at No Trump slams last time.

Today we will take a first look at bidding suited Small Slams using some form of Blackwood. *I assume that you all know the basic 4 Aces Blackwood.*

Extra tools such a Grand Slam tries, Trial bids, Cue bids and Splinters are left for later weeks.

Week 12 Slams

The key to a suited slam is control of the suits.

For every Ace you are missing, expect to lose (at least) one trick.

You generally need fewer high card points in a suited slam than in a NT slam, since often small trumps (of no *hcp* value) will win tricks. 30+hcp is quoted as enough to make a small suited slam and occasionally, with shapely hands, far fewer. Contrast this with the 33hcp needed in NT.

There is one major conventional bid that is used in most suit slam bidding, Blackwood, which is an Ace asking convention.

Basic Blackwood:

eq

4NT Partner, how many aces do you have?

5S/6S Either bail out (eg 5S) or bid slam (eg 6S)

You also have to work out where the cards are and **play** them in the right way.



Week 12 Blackwood and Variants

There are several Blackwood variants:

(my abbreviations)

Blackwood (the original, or basic Blackwood ~ "Bw")

Keycard Blackwood (as simple as "Bw" but better ~"KBw")

Roman Keycard Blackwood (Complicated ~ "RKBw")

(Basic) Blackwood:

Having agreed a suit as trumps, use "Bw" bid to enquire how many Aces partner has.

Determine your response to **every** reply **before** you bid Blackwood.

Keycard Blackwood:

As basic Blackwood but asking of 4 Aces and the King of Trumps.

Roman Keycard Blackwood:

Involved and with its own variants (0314 and 1430); Asks about 4 Aces and the King and Queen of Trumps.

U3AIB is recommending Keycard Blackwood.

Be aware that many players refer to RKBw as "Keycard Blackwood".



Week 12 Blackwood and Variants

All the Blackwoods are invoked with a 4NT bid. Which variant you are playing is determined by agreement with partner before the deal starts and is recorded on your *system card*.

(If you haven't discussed it with your partner, assume basic Blackwood.)

Being above 3NT, Blackwood does not need alerting unless used on the first round of bidding.

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Week 12 Blackwood and Variants

Do not use (any variety of) Blackwood if:

- You have a void.
 If Partner is missing an Ace is it the useful one where you have a
 weak suit or the useless one opposite a void which would allow you
 to ruff a trick good?
- You (as a pair) have a weak suit with 2 easy losers.
 You need first or second round control of every suit. A K L1.
- You do not have enough Joint Points to make a slam viable.
 Usually 30+ JPts.
- Some answer to the question could take you too high?
 Before using any Blackwood, determine your response to every reply.
 - Sometimes you will discover that the reply takes your contract higher than you want, in which case do not use it.

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Week 12 Keycard Blackwood

U3AIB is recommending Keycard Blackwood.

Prior to initiating Keycard Blackwood, you must have decided that a slam is a possibility and know what suit will be trumps.

If both partners have bid a suit, then trumps is explicitly agreed. If that has not happened, then the use of the 4NT bid means that the 4NT bidder is agreeing the pair's most recently bid suit as trumps.

Thus 1S (P) #3S (P) / #4NT explicitly agrees Spades as trumps.

And 1S (P) #4C (P) / 4NT where 4C is a splinter bid "agreeing Spades, Game points and a shortage in Clubs". (Ignore this for several weeks. Next year?)

But 1S (P) 2H (P) / #4NT implicitly agrees Hearts as trumps.

However 1NT! (P) #4NT is a Quantitative **NT** bid, asking "Pass(4NT) or 6NT"?

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Week 12 Keycard Blackwood

The five keycards are AS AH AD AC and KTrumps.

As responder to 4NT, count your keycards.

If you hold: S:KJT6 H:AQ43 D:QJ4 C:A7

When Spades are trumps, you have KS, AH, AC, so you answer "3 keycards".

But if Hearts are trumps, you only have AH, AC, and so answer "2 keycards".

Some responses have two possible meanings. Which one is meant should be obvious from the context of the auction. If in doubt assume the smaller quantity and let responder correct if appropriate.

Respond:

5C 0 or 4 keycards

5D 1 (or 5 ~ very rare) keycards

5H 2 keycards

5S 3 keycards





Week 12 Keycard Blackwood

When you use Keycard Blackwood, you have decided what you will rebid **before** responder responds.

If, jointly, missing 2+ keycards, bail out.

If, jointly, missing 1 keycard, bid a small slam in the agreed trump suit.

If, jointly, missing NO keycards, investigate a grand slam.

If that is not your plan, then do not use Blackwood in the first place.

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Week 12 When not to use Blackwood

Do not initiate Blackwood if you have a void. The problem there is that if partner has one of two missing keycards, might it be the useful one that works with your KQJxx or the mostly useless one in the void suit?

Do not use Blackwood if an answer can force you to bid a small slam without providing enough keycards. This typically occurs with minor suit slams.

Determine how each response from 0,1,2,3,4,5 keycards will work.

Do not use Blackwood unless you have control (as a pair) of all suits. Control is A or K or L1.





Week 12 Gerber

Gerber is similar to Blackwood but uses 4C as the asking bid. Do NOT use this, we want the 4C bid for other purposes.

The only scenario where Gerber may be used is whilst investigating NT slams, but not in auctions where Clubs have been bid naturally.

Play

Play as if "Duplicate Pairs".

{NS} have the pair number of their table, {N} has his back to the stage. {EW} have the pair number of their table plus 8.

Play boards in sequence. Have an incoming pile and an outgoing pile. Pass outgoing to next lower numbered table – Table 1 to highest table.

Some boards have instructions on card. The appropriate people should read each card at the time it says and follow its instructions.

If you play a board twice, record the second play on the traveller using your pair numbers PLUS TEN (eg 1 v 9 becomes 11 v 19)

If you wish to fill in a personal results card, they are available here. They are commonly used at duplicate clubs.

Don't forget to describe partner's bids and plays to the table.



Rotn Rotation Defined by one card, usually A♠.

Mostly different to source publication.

Dcl Declarer (NESW)

OL Opening Lead

Trk Tricks (0..13)

NS# EW# Score for NS or EW

NS% EW% Percentage of NS and EW

Ref Reference result (Sometimes there may be more than one)

Blue results as played.

Red results are reference results.


